

Stan Ivie

Professor Stanley Ivie received his B.S. in History and Philosophy from the University of Utah, his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in Comparative Education from George Peabody College where he was an NDEA Fellow. His dissertation was “The Educational Philosophy of Jose Vasconceles.” During his career as an educator he has taught high school social studies and been on the faculties of New Mexico Highlands, University of Arizona, North Carolina State University, and Georgia College. He served as Professor and department chair at Shaw University and at Texas Women’s University.

Professor Ivie has an impressive publication record. His articles have appeared in the *Peabody Journal of Education*, *Journal of Thought*, *Kappa Delta Pi Record*, *Comparative Education*, *The Educational Forum*, *Journal of Teacher Education*, *Journal of the Philosophy and History of Education*, *Proceedings of the Southwestern Philosophy of Education Society*, *Vitae Scholasticae*, *Texas Tech Journal of Education*, *The Psychological Record*, *College Student Journal*, *Contemporary Education*, *Education*, and *McGill Journal of Education*. Since 1966 he has published over 100 scholarly articles and books, including his 2003 book, *On the Wings of Metaphor* (Caddo Gap) which Howard Gardner called “lively and provocative.” In an email to Professor Ivie, Gardner writes, “I like the link (metaphor) that you made between Plato’s cave and standard testing of the IQ sort. Intelligence tests purport to document something real but at best they are pale and misleading shadows of the intellect.”

At the end of the academic year 2006-2007 Professor Ivie retired from Texas Women’s University. He and his wife, Jeri Castleberry Ivie, moved to Richfield, Utah where he has spent the past few summers building a corral for Jeri’s two horses, Moon Baby and Chocolate, and (literally from the ground up) a home in the country surrounded by impressive scenery and mountains.
